GLENRAC hosted a day out at Little Llangothlin Nature Reserve – RAMSAR site – last month in partnership with National Parks and Wildlife Service, Local Land Services, and Banbai rangers to share with community the research our project scientists have been doing there this Year 4 of our five year project.

2022 is the first time in three years that the lagoon is full of water and bird life! Participants told us that the scientists' presentations on the flora and wildlife of the reserve, and the dynamic nature of the lagoon was what pleased them most to learn about this internationally recognised threatened ecological system.

Keep an eye out for a final field day at the reserve in 2023 so you can catch the new information uncovered by our research scientists in the project funded by the Australian Government and Northern Tablelands Local Land Services.

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PROJECT NEWS AND ACTIVITIES BUSH FOR BIODIVERSITY

Regional Landcare's 'Bush for Biodiversity' two day event in Glen Innes 25 and 26 March was an interesting and much enjoyed opportunity to connect with nature and discover how we can manage and conserve vital ecosystems across the Northern Tablelands.

A joint project with Biodiversity Conservation Trust and Landcare NSW, regional Landcare networks came together to provide landholders and community members with information on private land conservation. Leading ecosystem scientists, John Hunter and Alex Dudley gave their own experiences with land conservation and how best we can support the many threatened and endangered plant and animal species that are vital to the health of our woodlands and pastures. New **England Weeds Authority officers** described the key invasive plants in the Northern Tablelands and how we can control them and prevent their spread.

Biodiversity Conservation Trust officer Mark Blair led our community members through a demonstration on how to monitor their conservation properties by establishing plots in key sections across the landscape for regular checking of plant and soil health.

There will be a day at a conservation property at Glen Elgin in September where the landholder's experiences over 22 years of conservation management will be shared in a walk through the snow gums. Watch GLENRAC's media for the chance to register and attend the








PROJECT NEWS AND ACTIVITIES DEER IN THE HEADLIGHTS

With increasing impact across the Glen Innes area landholders gathered at the Yarraford Hall to learn more about deer with presenter Stuart Boyd-Law. With a range of antlers and skins on display, participants identification skills were challenged, to be able to better recognize the different species that are known to be in this area. Identification and the habits of these species were then covered in more detail.

The current situation regarding control of deer and the Game and Feral Animal Control Act 2022 and regulation was discussed. Recent projects like aerial shooting programs were highlighted as one of few current options for control and the need to remove a significant proportion of the population to have an impact on deer numbers was recognized as an issue.

Peter West who is the Feral Scan Coordinator with NSW Department of Primary Industries joined the meeting via video and gave a demonstration on the monitoring tool Deer Scan. Deer Scan can be used via the website or phone app and is a

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PEST ANIMALS UNDER FIRE

The number of people ready to take on local rabbits and foxes has increased with two groups of Girls with Guns completing Firearms Safety Training recently at the Glen Innes Pistol Club. When the initial workshop was advertised the interest was overwhelming so a second course was scheduled, and there is still a waiting list. Participants commented that it was a great opportunity to build knowledge and skills in an environment that was comfortable.

One participant said after the event "I can honestly say that I walked in knowing very little and walked out at the end of the day feeling confident that I can now take the next step in this journey". With their Firearms Safety Certificates and confidence having taken some shots they can now apply for a Firearms Licence.

As well as the Girls with Guns a group of teenagers also increased their skills with Young Guns, a firearms safety workshop for 12-18 year olds looking to get their minor's permit. This is the sixth Young Guns workshop that GLENRAC have facilitated with trainer Stuart Boyd-Law.

This project received funding from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.





FLUKE AND WATER




Figure 1 Life Cycle of Liver Fluke

Up here on Northern Tablelands we get both liver flukes and stomach flukes that can cause severe, even fatal, disease in our livestock. They're not close relatives but both these flukes need water snails to complete their life cycle from egg to adult (Figure 1).

With the amount of water lying everywhere, you don't have to be a genius to realise that the water-snails will have bred successfully this year and spread over much larger areas of the countryside than usual. Since a single fluke egg multiplies into about 600 cysts inside the snail and these cysts stick on plants and can survive for months or even years, there will be widespread infection of grazing stock for many months to come. With the amount of pasture around, it could well be some time before the lowest few inches of pasture (where the cysts have attached) are grazed so expect problems in the future.

Most people know that liver fluke treatment is best done in April and



August up here – apart from the quarantine drench given when bought-in stock arrive. However, stomach fluke are a problem in late autumn and winter causing black diarrhoea as larvae migrate through the intestines towards the 'stomach' (adults are mostly found in the reticulum and cause little or no problem). Fluke diagnosis is a blend of clinical signs, post-mortem and faecal egg count; only NilzanTM (Coopers) works against stomach fluke larvae.

People can't develop liver fluke by eating cattle, sheep or even deer livers but - just to warn you – Glen Innes was once the site of major human liver fluke problem when people ate water cress that was contaminated with fluke cysts. So much for being a vegetarian!!
