TREE IDENTIFICATION FIELD DAY AT RUMMERYS HILL

The first Saturday of November was spent with Rummerys Hill Landcare Group at "Redbank" with Tom and Lucy Faithfull and the members of the landcare group. Our wonderful ecologist, Peter Croft, taught us the simple ways to identify the different Eucalypt tree species and native bushes and flowers using the J.B. Williams Key to the New England Eucalypts.

Tom and Lucy are working with the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Trust to conserve woodlands and this day was a perfect opportunity for Rummerys Hill neighbours to come together and increase their expertise and knowledge of our native flora. We bird watched too and identified a number of rare species although, not the critically - endangered Regent Honeyeater - one species we truly hoped to spot! We got to witness a natural hollow in a Eucalypt that Tom says has been occupied by generations of brushtail possums for many years - thanks to Jim Barker for the excellent photograph.



SIT IN FOR NATURE CAMPAIGN

GLENRAC took part in a national community art exhibition in October: Sit in for Nature Campaign organised by Carmel Killin - to honour all of our threatened and endangered species. GLENRAC's project manager, Mahri Koch, spent a Sunday at The Local in Glen Innes sharing information and images with visitors about our spotted tailed quoll, the critically endangered Regent Honeyeater, and a number of our threatened flora species.

Artworks of threatened species created by people across Australia were displayed at The Local for everyone to enjoy. We talked about where the threatened species live and what the key threats to their survival are. GLENRAC thanks Jim Barker for his excellent photography on the day



PROTECTING AND ENHANCING BIODIVERSITY: TREE PLANTING IN ACTION

GLENRAC has just completed a two year project funded by the NSW Environmental Trust that has planted 17,320 native seedlings with 26 participating landholders, and at 35 sites across the Northern Tablelands. The project concentrated on supporting and protecting two threatened ecological floral communities, New England Peppermint and White Box, Yellow Box, Blakely's red gum grassy woodlands.

GLENRAC was supported in the project by Glen Industries' horticultural division where the seedlings where carefully maintained and watered, and later planted. Continuation of funding to restore ecosystems across the Northern Tablelands is essential to enhance biodiversity and protect endangered woodlands now and into the future.

HOMES FOR SQUIRREL GLIDERS AND GLOSSY BLACK COCKATOOS

GLENRAC's project to provide Homes and Habitat for Gliders & Glossy Black Cockatoos is progressing well, with 6,000 food and habitat seedlings planted at Currys Gap and Torrington State Conservation Areas as well as on two private properties. The project will also install 100 artificial nestboxes for squirrel gliders and glossy black cockatoos when the ground conditions allow for machinery access.



SURVEYING OUR FROGS PLEASE HELP

Dr Jodi Rowley, Amphibian and reptile conservation curator with the Australian Museum, has put out a call for help from all of us to record sightings and sounds of frogs across the Glen Innes and Guyra areas following the mass mortality event that occurred in the winter of 2021.

Dr Rowley's team has been conducting frog surveys in our area to find out how the frogs are faring in the wake of this event. She is now appealing to all of us to help her team by recording the calls of frugs using the *FrogID* app.

"Dead frogs were reported across rural paddocks and suburban backyards, and sick frogs were found sitting out in the open during the day, often discoloured and with patchy skin. In total, in that winter alone, over 1600 reports were received by people across Australia of sick and dead frogs," Dr Rowley said in her request for help.

INFORMATION, OPPORTUNITIES AND FUNDING

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE AND LUMPY SKIN DISEASE

With the detection of Foot and Mouth Disease and Lumpy Skin Disease in Indonesia recently, it is important landholders be extra vigilant, understand what to look for, check your animals regularly and report any suspect cases.

Animal diseases can have a serious impact on livestock activity, trade and even human health. If you suspect or know of a notifiable animal disease, you have a legal obligation to report it immediately.

Fortunately Australia currently has a disease-free status for foot and mouth disease and lumpy skin disease, however we all need to play an active role in monitoring and reporting any suspect cases.

Your support is essential to protect NSW's clean reputation and ensure ongoing market access. An early report can make the difference between a disease becoming established or being eradicated.

Foot and mouth disease and lumpy skin disease are nationally notifiable diseases. It is critical that all livestock owners know what these diseases look like and that you check your animals regularly, reporting any suspect signs immediately to your local district vet on 1300 295 299 or the Emergency Animal Disease Watch Hotling on 1800 675 888.

2023 RURALBIZ TRAINING SCHOLARSHIPS

Apply now for a full-fee scholarship in 2023! Courses:

- AHC50116 Diploma of Agriculture or
- AHC51422 Diploma of Agribusiness Management

Eligibility:

To meet the scholarship eligibility requirements, you must:

- have regular and ongoing access to a farm on which you can base your assessment tasks
- be an Australian citizen or permanent resident
- reside in a Regional, Rural or Remote area defined as RA2, RA3, RA4, or RA5 on the ASGS Remoteness Area Map 2016. (You can check your RA zone by entering your address, selecting the remoteness area filter here: Remoteness Area Map and select the remoteness ASGS 2016 filter.)

You need to complete a course enrollment application.

If you are not found to be eligible for a scholarship, you will be given the option of a standard enrollment or withdrawing your enrollment application.

Applications close 13 January 2023. Successful applicants are expected to complete all required enrolment procedures by 28 February 2023.

NOW ONLINE! VERTEBRATE PESTICIDE INDUCTION TRAINING

To acquire and use 1080, Pindone, RHDV, or PAPP baits in NSW, you must be accredited (or under the direct supervision of an accredited person) with an AQF3 Chemical Accreditation or *Vertebrate Pesticide Induction Training (VPIT)* course accreditation.

Our *online VPIT course* takes approximately two hours to complete and mirrors traditional face-to-face training using video and other online learning methods. Once you successfully complete the eight modules and five exams within the session, you will be emailed a certificate which is valid for up to five years.

The Local Land Services course takes you through the legal responsibilities, safety requirements and practical considerations for an effective use of baits and pesticides.




WEED FOCUS - GORSE (ULEX EUROPAEUS)

Gorse is an invasive spiny shrub that forms dense impenetrable thickets. It can reduce pasture carrying capacity, block access and provide shelter for pests.

In National Parks and other environmental areas, gorse can compete with native vegetation and increase the risk of bushfire as it contains flammable oils and retains dead vegetation, increasing fuel loads.

Gorse is a spiny, branched, evergreen, perennial shrub, which commonly grows 1- 2.5 m in height. It is long-lived (up to 30 years) and has a deep and extensive root system.


