\$150,000 BIODIVERSITY BLOOM FOR GLEN **INNES DISTRICT FARMERS**

GLEN Innes district landholders are dusting off the shovels and gearing up for a tree planting program which will see almost 20,000 native trees and shrub species added to the landscape, with Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall today announcing a \$149,998 State Government Environmental Trust grant for the project, co-ordinated by GLENRAC.

Mr Marshall said the tree planting effort would cover approximately 35 individual sites, on 12 privately managed farming properties.

"This is a great win for local farmers and the environment," Mr Marshall said.

"This project will enhance areas of threatened ecological communities, improve the overall health of soils, native fauna and the general landscape for vears to come.

"With much of the Glen Innes district having undergone some level of clearing many decades ago, landholders identified the need for more shade and shelter for livestock, and habitat for native birds, animals and beneficial insects.

"Planting of seedlings will occur in spring 2023 and spring 2024. Between now and then landholders will be working on ground preparation and establishing fenced areas to give the seedlings the best chance of success.

"I want to recognise the work GLERAC has done in working with landholders to reverse the decline in native vegetation and work towards a more sustainable farming future."

GLENRAC CEO Kylie Falconer said the new plantings would provide habitat for flora and fauna species across a fragmented landscape.

"The sites being targeted are in areas of open and exposed landscape, and are particularly in areas which adjoin national reserve," Ms Falconer said.

"The plant species which will be planted will be those known to be present in two threatened ecological communities - New England Peppermint the natural environment.

grassy woodlands and White box-Yellow box-Blakley's red gum grassy woodlands.

"This project will have an economic flow-on effect into the community, as we utilise Glen Innes region suppliers for materials, and local contractors to assist with planting of seedlings.

"We are really proud that by the end of spring 2024 more than 19,000 natives will have been planted on properties around Glen Innes, boosting biodiversity and reinvigorating this productive part of our region."

The NSW Environmental Trust Restoration and Rehabilitation program helps organisations protect, conserve and restore landscapes and waterways of importance to local and regional communities.

This year's grants were targeted at projects supporting the priorities of threatened species recovery and addressing climate change impacts on the natural environment.






Saving the Swift Parrot - Conservation and Management Guide

Birdlife Australia, in partnership with Local Land Services and the

Australian Government, have published this month an information guide to the critically endangered Swift Parrot – a bird that travels from its breeding grounds in Tasmania each autumn and winter to forage across south-eastern Australia before returning to Tasmania in spring.

This booklet is now available at our office for community to become familiar with the bird's identification, lifestyle and breeding patterns, and how we can overcome the threats to its continued existence including its key Eucalypt tree species for food and hollows. The Swift Parrot has been sighted across the western and northern parts of the New England Tablelands, so if you have Mugga Ironbark, White Box-Yellow Box or Spotted Gum woodland, there is a chance the Swift Parrot might visit there this autumn and winter.

GLENRAC is working with Local Land Services to assist in suitable revegetation for it and the Regent Honeyeater, and raising awareness of these two critically endangered bird species. Stop by the office and pick up your free copy of the Guide.

PROJECT NEWS AND ACTIVITIES BEEKEEPING BASICS SMOKO EVENT

Who would have thought that there were so many budding beekeepers in our community? The Beekeeping Basics Event held on 7 June at the Agricultural Research Station was filled to capacity. An extremely interested group of 18 people were presented with an informative session led by Allan Thomas.

Allan talked about the importance of bees to the environment and to the supply of our food. He discussed how bees must be managed and why. A very good demonstration covered the structure of a hive and its components. The important topics of disease and the legal requirements for beekeepers were also discussed.

PROJECT NEWS AND ACTIVITIES SHRUBS FOR STUDENTS



These youngsters from Glen West infants School each received a *Leptospermum polygalifolium* seedling (a.k.a known as Tantoon or Jelly Bush) thanks to a generous donation from Dandarrga Landcare's Native Nursery. This very hardy shrub can be pruned to create a dense plant – often flowering very heavily, creating a stunning show – or grow to 6 metres tall. It creates an abundance of food for insects and birds and is an excellent seasonal food source for fauna – with the medicinal honey produced from it sometimes exceeding the strength of its more famous relative, the Manuka!

The general common name, Teatree, derives from the practice of early Australian settlers who soaked the leaves of several species in boiling water to make herbal tea.

THE HEALING SOUNDS AND STORIES OF MELINDA SCHNEIDER

110 people from across the region recently came together to enjoy the soulful sounds and stories of multi-award winning singer-songwriter, Melinda Schneider at the Glen Innes RSL.

Organised by GLENRAC, in partnership with the Rural Adversity Mental Health Program (RAMHP), the evening featured music performances by Melinda, intertwined with stories of her life and battles with mental health.

With a career in the Australian music industry spanning over 40 years, Melinda's accolades have

included 15 albums, six CMAA Golden Guitars and a live theatre tour. She has also worn many other career hats during this time, including fashion designer, actress and CEO of MPOWER Records.

But with the incredible success of Melinda's career also came enormous pressure, extreme hours and tireless work. In 2018, she found herself overwhelmed by depression and anxiety, and she shared her feelings of shame and guilt at her wellbeing with the audience.

'What did I have to be depressed about? I had a great life, a successful career, a home, a kind and loving partner and a beautiful son. There were so many people worse off than me,' said Melinda.

'I've since learned that it's all relative and comparisons don't help. They only make you feel worse. It's validation a person with depression needs. Permission to feel exactly how they need to feel at any given time.'

Melinda, who in 2020 partnered with RAMHP as an ambassador to raise awareness of mental health, offered words of kindness, hope and resilience and shared the importance of building strong community connections to help get through the tough times. In the rural setting of Glen Innes which

has battled its own share of adversity over the last decade, this advice is particularly poignant.

'For me, to be gentle on yourself means learning to stop self-judgement and treating myself with the same unconditional love I give my child. This doesn't come easily, it takes practice, daily.'

The evening also included discussions with RAMHP Coordinators, Leitita Cross and Andrew Daley, as well as entertainment from GLENRAC Treasurer Sam Baker who was the MC on the night.

'It was great to see a healthy crowd at the RSL and Glen provide a warm welcome to Melinda,' said Sam Baker.

'Melinda's presentation was excellent, and she must be congratulated on her bravery in sharing an unvarnished take on her childhood and challenges with mental health.

'Her message of being kind to yourself and being prepared to reach out to our support network of friends, family and health professionals is a very important one, which we should all take on board.

'A big thanks to the organising crew and attendees for making the night a winner on all fronts.'

PROJECT NEWS AND ACTIVITIES NEW SERIES OF FREE FARM BUSINESS WORKSHOPS FOR YOUNG FARMERS AND THEIR FAMILIES

The Young Farmers night on the 15th June kicked off GLENRAC's new farm business project: a series of online and self-paced upskilling workshops targeted at young and emerging farmers and their families who might be transitioning into the running of an existing farm business or starting their own.

Funded by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal's Future Drought Fund and delivered by farm business consultants Carmen Quade and Emily Sinderberry, the workshop series will cover areas integral to sustaining a successful farm business, including bookkeeping and accounting essentials like BAS, tax, super, contracting and paying staff; utilising excel for decision making and planning; record keeping; budgeting; and how to navigate farm family dynamics.

This program of events recognises the influx of young families both new and familiar to the Glen Innes area, many of whom may be partners or spouses encountering the logistics of working in a farm business for the first time and unsure of how to become involved.

Building skills in how to run an effective, resilient and successful farm provides a doorway for all members of the family to feel empowered and valued, both in the business and the wider agricultural community.

'Being in a farm business or rural community as an outsider can be isolating and difficult,' said Rural Financial Counsellor Jessica Brown.

'The aim of this project is to aid in bridging this gap and help provide skills and means for partners to entrench themselves in the business and community.'

The workshop series will also foster connection and community belonging by creating opportunities for young farming families in the region to get to know each other and create networks that will last long into the future.
