CHAIRMAN'S REPORT presented by Ian Lockwood

I would like to emphasise the importance of the name of GLENRAC being the Glen Innes Natural Resources Advisory Committee and the fact that GLENRAC is more than a Landcare group, while we do Landcare work we do many other things as well.

Memberships have reached 1260 people so we must be doing something right. These members gain information from weekly e-flashes, Facebook, Instagram and newsletters. Membership has expanded beyond just the Glen Innes district. Many people attend events with more than 2078 people attending in total. GLENRAC has facilitated a diversity of training sessions for the community including First Aid, Chemical courses, Mental Health, First Aid, Ladies' days, making nest boxes and pasture days.

Our funding has come from grants. GLENRAC has applied for 75 grants and secured 29, which is a 40% success rate to a value of \$1,108,166 with a focus on bushfire recovery and building resilience. Our projects are mostly with another partner. These partners include Glen Innes Severn Council. GLENRAC is now delivering a Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience project for GISC, this involves the delivery of training for local, small, and rural businesses (\$100,000). A larger project of \$680,000 is for Community Combatting Pests and Weed Impacts During Drought. All work here to be done by using local contractors. GLENRAC has been fortunate in having a good working relationship with Glen Innes Severn Council.

Another project has been funded by Murray Darling Healthy Rivers (Federal Govt). This project is in partnership with Inverell Council, GISC, GWYMAC, Glen Innes and Ashford Aboriginal Lands Councils and NT Local Land Services and New England Weeds Authority to control Honey Locust along the Severn River.

Bushfire Recovery projects funded by Northern Tablelands Local Land Service were small on-farm projects focussed on weeds and animal welfare – 59 projects in the Glen Innes area, 9 in the Southern New England area.

Very recently we had 60 participants in a project in conjunction with LLS and Southern New England Landcare focussed on Chilean Needle Grass at Guyra. Great to see good attendance at events. Have also hosted pasture walks at Walcha and Wongwibinda as part of a Meat and Livestock Australia funded project.

GLENRAC's work has been recognised with an award for the Community Event of the Year at the 2021 Australia Day Awards for the 2019 Christmas Smoko and for the Environmental Citizen of the Year, Jennie Coldham. GLENRAC was also recognised as a Highly Commended Finalist in the NSW Get Ready Community Resilience Awards.

GLENRAC have also updated the Strategic Plan since the last AGM. The committee worked with Julia Telford, from Engage & Create Consulting from Goondiwindi to develop priorities and strategies. A survey of members and external stakeholders was also undertaken with some really positive feedback.

I would like to thank the Committee of Management for their dedication and recognised their diversity of skills and expertise. 2022 has presented some real challenges to the committee from COVID and I am hoping for more fun in 2022. I would also like to extend a thanks to the staff and acknowledge their hard work and dedication and for the happy workplace that it is. Thank you to Kylie for her leadership of the organisation, professionalism and hard work.

I would also like to acknowledge the service to the committee from Col Price and Graham Price over a number of years. Thank you for your dedication to contributing to GLENRAC's activities.







Engaging new participants & partnerships in Landcare activities

The issue

The 2019-2020 bushfires had a devastating impact upon the Glen Innes region following 18 months of intense drought, challenging the community physically and mentally, as well as hindering opportunities for social interaction. This project aimed to host two garden events in the Torrington and Glen Elgin regions which were directly impacted by bushfire, bringing together community members in a laid back environment where they could catch up with friends old and new, whilst also enjoying learning garden design tips from leading industry experts.

The solution

GLENRAC organised a winter garden weekend to take place across the 2021 June long weekend in two gardens that were directly impacted by bushfire: 'Rosedale' at Stannum, and 'Whinstanes' at Skeleton Creek. Both events included a presentation and garden tour by gardening author and Gardening Australia presenter alumni Meredith Kirton, as well as talks by local nursery owners and experts Sarah Caldwell from Mole Station Native Nursery and Pam Youman from Black Mountain Nursery. The local NSW Department of Primary Industries Recovery Support Officer Jane Munro also chaired both events.

The impact

260+ people turned out to enjoy the garden weekend. Many had previously never attended a GLENRAC event before and 30+ new memberships were acquired. LP funding allowed GLENRAC staff to design these unique events never hosted before in the region, and engage with new partners such as the DPI Local Recovery Support Officer, Meredith Kirton, Black Mountain Nursery, Deepwater School P&C and Glen Innes Pony Club. Local small businesses were also supported at the event, with handmade crafts by Carmel Yeoman, Allana Price and Bridget Brummell gifted to the presenters and vouchers to the Garden Patch Nursery awarded as prizes.

Learnings

The overwhelming turnout to the first GLENRAC Winter Garden Weekend highlights the joy of gardening and its important role in recovery after devastating events, as well as how important it is for people in rural communities to have opportunities for social interaction. The number of new attendees and first-time partnerships fostered shows the power of working with the community to create a positive impact.

The issue

After the enormous increase in GLENRAC Facebook engagement during 2019-2020 (page 'Likes' and 'Follows' increased almost 100%), how could the platform continue to be utilised to: connect and engage with new people across the region and wider; communicate the array of events and information available from GLENRAC and other relevant bodies; address Priority D of GLENRAC's Strategic Plan, 'Working Towards a Sustainable Future' through extending GLENRAC's reach and building strong relationships with other organisations; and, maintaining communication with Landcare and the wider community as according to the Local Priority Plan.

The solution

A strong communications strategy was identified to meet the above identified challenges which focused on consistently creating engaging content that is relatable, relevant and interesting to the Landcare and wider community. This content could include sharing and promoting: upcoming events, images of activities happening at GLENRAC and the Glen Innes community, relevant funding and information updates from Landcare NSW, Northern Tablelands Local Land Services and other networks, as well as authorised agricultural, financial, wellbeing support and community bodies. Accompanying this media strategy was a focus on producing quality in-house designed flyers, information and events that include images and graphics relevant to the community.

The impact

GLENRAC has continued to see an impressive growth in engagement that expands far beyond the Glen Innes region and across the globe. In FY20-21 Page 'Likes' have increased from 940 > 1263 and 'Followers' have increased from 974 > 1480 (interestingly this has coincided with a 25% increase in GLENRAC membership, from 1004 > 1260). Posts from June 2021 alone have reached 12,368 people and these have been engaged with 4677 times.

Household Composting & Worm Farming 101!

The issue

The physical, emotional and fi nancial stressors of life on the land can create challenges for people in rural communities to come together to socialise and build new skills. Du ring 2019-2020, these stressors were significantly exacerbated by extreme drought and bush fi re across the Glen Innes region. Opportunities for connection, sharing and learning became extremely limited and social connections were strained.

The solution

Across two days in mid February 2021, GLENRAC hosted Nicki Walker from North East Waste at the Glen Innes Showgrounds who hosted two workshops focused on Household Composting & Worm Farming. Nicki has a wealth of knowledge around sustainable and cost-effective waste management solutions & is a gifted presenter with an engaging, easy manner. 58 people from across all age brackets & skill levels attended these workshops, enjoying the interactive demonstrations that covered the ins & outs of all things compost & worm farm related, including choosing the right systems for your lifestyle, how to get started, what and what NOT to put in your compost, maintaining and using the multi-purpose and nutrient rich castings from worm farms, demystifying worm juice - what is it, what can you do with it and how do you use it, and taking your composting to the premium level.

The impact

Both workshops were extremely successful, with attendees extremely engaged throughout the sessions & providing great feedback about the event. Five worm farms and two compost systems were also given out as lucky door prizes over the two days which added to the air of excitement. Attendees also enjoyed a delicious morning tea spread from local caterer Helen Morgan which they enjoyed catching up over during the break. These workshops provided an opportunity for attendees to build skills in the area of sustainability, whilst also providing a reason for people to catch up and connect.

Key facts

Bright & Beautiful at GLENRAC's Rural Women's Day 2021

The issue

The physical, emotional and financial stressors of life on the land can be a challenge for rural women at the best of times, and during 2019-2020, these were significantly exacerbated by extreme drought and bushfire across the Glen Innes region. Opportunities for women to come together to connect, share and learn were extremely limited during this time and social connections were strained.

The solution

On the 15 th October 2021, GLENRAC hosted a Rural Women's Day gathering at Glen Dawn Woolshed which was attended by 60 women from across the region. Held in conjunction with International Rural Women's Day, the theme of the day celebrated growing women's health, wealth and wellness. The aim of the day was to help rural women build confidence and develop new skills in all aspects of their lives, as well as providing opportunity to catch up with old and new friends and provide peer support to many who were continuing to deal with the impacts of drought and bushfire recovery. Leading industry experts presented on the day, including financial advisor Ben Law (a.k.a. QLD Country Life's Financial Bloke), Mental health coordinator, Letitia Cross from RAMHP, exercise physiologist Ellen Adams from Moveology New England & health nurse Chris Connor from Healthwise.

The impact

The day was an overwhelming success, with the women enjoying the opportunity to join together after periods of extreme isolation. Local caterer Rashelle Bischoff from the Sage and Clover created a beautiful spread on the day which all attendees enjoyed. The day provided an important opportunity for women to build new skills and confidence in areas of health and wellbeing, peer networking & financial freedom; ideas that could then be taken home and applied to their family life.

Supporting drought, bushfire & COVID affected rural community groups within the Glen Innes district to celebrate Christmas events

The issue

The effects of the 2019-2020 drought & bushfire events continued to be felt across the Glen innes region, physically, emotionally & financially. To add further insult to injury, the stressors of COVID-19, particularly the isolation experienced by all during this time, meant that many community groups, villages & localities around Glen Innes felt too overwhelmed to organise a Christmas gathering - usually an annual event. Traditionally, these events provide opportunity for connection, communication and social inclusion, as well as excitement and celebration - elements that are extremely important to cultivate in rural communities, particularly during times of high pressure.



After the success of the 2019 Christmas events that Red Cross Let's Talk funding assisted, GLENRAC again supplied financial support to community groups around the region to assist with the running of Christmas events. This support assisted by reducing the financial burden on small communities to fund the costs of the event, as well as injecting economic stimulus back into the Glen Innes community as all money was spent at local businesses in town.

GLENRAC were able to provide financial assistance to 13 Christmas events during December 2020 across the Glen Innes District, including Ben Lomond Landcare Group (35), Bolivia Progress Association (45), Deepwater School of Arts (130), Deepwater Progress Association (100), Deepwater Tennis Club (27), Dundee (30), Emmaville (200), Glen Elgin (60), Kings Plains (45), Pinkett (83), Rummerys Hill Landcare Group (25), Torrington (43) & the Wellingrove Progress Association (72).

The impact

Approximately 895 attendees participated in one of the 13 Christmas events supported by GLENRAC, a number considered by organisers to be overwhelmingly positive given the challenges of COVID-19 restrictions. Unfortunately, the social distancing laws meant that some communities felt unable to take the risk of running any event at all. Where possible, GLENRAC were able to assist groups with creating a COVID safe plan and also in the creation of the event flyers.

By relieving the fi nancial burden of some of the elements of the event, community groups were able to put their energy into planning a day that fostered connection and communication within their community group, combatting isolation at a time of the year when togetherness is needed most,











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

THE ISSUE

The 2019-2020 bushfires had a devastating impact upon the Glen Innes region following 18 months of intense drought, challenging the community physically, emotionally and financially. The impact of the bushfires saw some people isolating from the community while they dealt with the enormity and intensity of the fires, which was then compounded due to COVID-19 restrictions. Local hospitality businesses also suffered during this time. Years of natural disasters had left the community with limited discretionary funds for luxury items like eating out, and the pandemic led to forced closures and limited operations, as well as travel restrictions that prevented the regular flow of tourists stopping in to spend money.

THE SOLUTION

Funding from St Vincent de Paul allowed GLENRAC to offer 'Fire Break' meal vouchers to the Glen Innes community, a project that financially supported small groups of people to gather together to network and share with each other over a meal at a local hospitality hub in the Glen Innes Severn Shire. The vouchers covered up to \$300 of the cost of the meal (alcohol not included) and provided a much needed opportunity for people in the community to get together and support each other during the challenging time, without having to worry about the financial pressure of doing so. The project also reduced the impact of isolation in rural communities and fostered mental wellbeing and wellness amongst those who participated in an event.

The 'Fire Break' meal vouchers also supported local hospitality businesses as money was being spent in venues, with a flow-on to suppliers and therefore the wider local economy.

THE IMPACT

This funding supported 50 'Fire Break' dinners in the Glen Innes community, with 462 people attending a dinner and one event having more than 60 people in attendance. The hospitality venues supported included the Railway Tavern Bistro, New England Motor Lodge, Hereford Steakhouse, Yim Thai, Dragon Court, Great Central Hotel, The Local, Campbells Butchery, Bruce Family Butchers, Helen Morgan Catering, Town Hall Coffee Shop, The Glen Pie Shop, Smeatons Bakery, Deepwater Brewery and Deepwater Bakery.


