2013 COUNTRY ARTS GRANT PROGRAM

Applications are open for the 2013 Country Arts Support Program (CASP), which offers small grants up to \$3,000 per applicant, to regionally-based arts and community organisations and local arts councils for short-term, locally-initiated projects. CASP is an annual small grants round, funded by Arts NSW.

We recommend that interested groups download the forms as soon as possible and applicants must contact their regional arts body to discuss their project.

The 2012 CASP small grants round is open to projects taking place between January 1 and December 31, 2013.

REGENERATING AGRICULTURE AND PROFITABLE GRAZING

Young graziers in the Glen Innes District who want to improve farm production and protect their natural resources, are being encouraged to take advantage of subsidised training to attend a 2 ½ day sustainable grazing workshop. "Pasture to Pocket" begins 23rd October and is presented by Resource Consulting Services at the heavily discounted price of \$100 per person (normally \$1,000). It involves a mix of "in room" theory discussions as well as a field trip focusing on applying the principles and tools discussed.

The Pasture to Pocket program links property development, grazing management and pastures with animal nutrition and reproduction for a sustainable and profitable business. This course helps the farmer know with confidence, when to graze and when to rest paddocks. Add in the other topics of property development, nutrition, reproduction and economics, and the farmer is equipped to run a sustainable farm business to suit their circumstances.

The course provides information for graziers to calculate total stock feed requirements for their herd as well as total pasture feed availability for the months ahead so grazing intensity can be matched to pasture growth to maximise productivity.

A detailed understanding of carrying capacity and pasture growth patterns can lead to increased productivity, faster pasture regeneration and increased ground cover without added seed, fertilizer, machinery or chemicals.
