LOCAL LAND SERVICES ELECTIONS ON 12 MARCH 2014

The inaugural Local Land Services Board Member elections will take place on 12 March 2014. There are three members to be elected to each region. This is an opportunity for ratepayers to have a say in who can best represent the needs and priorities of their region.


Nominations for Board member positions are now open. Occupiers of rateable land are eligible to nominate a candidate. Nominations close **5pm 31 January 2014**. Ratepayers across the State are encouraged to enrol to vote by lodging an enrolment form to be eligible to vote in the 2014 LLS elections.

Only persons on the Local Land Services electoral roll for the region will be eligible to vote. Persons on the electoral rolls of Livestock Health and Pest Authorities will not have their names automatically transferred to the LLS electoral roll.

Sheep and Beef Cattle Farming Rebate

For a limited time, Workcover is offering a promotional rebate - up to \$2000 for sheep and beef cattle farmers with 0 - 50 full time employees (or equivalent) who adopt an eligible safety solution in their workplace.

The rebates are available for a limited time, subject to available funds, and exclude GST, freight and insurance.

Eligible activities include

- Animal loading ramps.
- Tractor roll over protection structures (ROPS)
- Sun Shade protection over stock yards
- Lifting devices.
- Non Slip Flooring
- Handrails
- Drainage system in sheds
- Personal Protective Equipment and safety signage.

WorkCover is committed to working with industry and the community to address these risks and will be delivering a range of activities and resources to assist sheep and beef cattle farmers.

The rebate will be available for items purchased between 1st October 2013 to 31st May 2014. Rebate applications must be lodged by the **31st May 2014**

GLENRAC PROJECT SNAPSHOT

BRG-CMA HEALTHY SOILS AND SOIL SOLUTIONS

This project still has the second half to run including 4 workshops to be run by Jeff Lowien in autumn, demonstrating soil sampling procedures, funding soil sample tests and then guiding participants through the results.

HONEY LOCUST

Control works are continuing on participating private properties along the Severn and Macintyre Rivers. This project will also fund a joint control effort on crown land at the 3-mile crossing at Ashford which will take place in the coming weeks. Treatment here is critical as this area is a major seed source of Honey Locust. GLENRAC will be conducting inspections on participating properties in the coming weeks. We urge anyone who has Honey Locust and adjoins the Severn or Macintyre rivers to contact us as there is still funding available.

GLENRAC PROJECT SNAPSHOT

LANDCARE ADVENTURE 2014 'Healthy Land - Resilient Communities'

The Landcare Adventure will be held on 19th and 20th March starting at the Glen Innes Showground.

Guest speakers include Terry McCosker and Isobel Knight. Terry McCosker is an internationally acclaimed teacher and has worked in research, extension and property management for 45 years. Terry has published over 40 papers and made discoveries in the fields of bull fertility, ruminant nutrition and pasture ecology. Terry co-founded RCS over 25 years ago, which has set the benchmark for capacity building in rural and regional Australia. Terry is a pioneer in the field of soil carbon and carbon farming.

Isobel Knight is a succession planner who has helped hundreds of farming families transition their business. Isobel believes that succession planning is an area in agriculture which has been dealt with poorly in the past, and she saw this as an opportunity to do it better.

There will be a dinner with entertainment and local landcare network awards night on the 19th. Guest speaker at the dinner will be Sam Bailey.

Sam Bailey is a farmer, pilot, husband and best-selling author. He has achieved all of those from a wheelchair and has an incredible ability to take an audience on the journey of his life.

From a childhood growing up in the Australian bush to a car accident in the outback that turned his life upside down and its aftermath, Sam tells his story in his own down-to-earth laconic style that captures the great Australian spirit of 'having a go'.

He relates how he beat the odds to fulfil his life-long dream to be a farmer, learning to ride a four wheel bike; devising a hoist to get into farm machinery and ultimately learning to fly an ultra light aircraft.

Sam then found his soul mate in former Tamworth-based ABC radio Rural Reporter, Jenny Black.



Today they live and work together on their beef cattle property in North West NSW, in between travelling the country telling their story and giving inspiration to others.

The Landcare Adventure will also feature rotation sessions on soils, grazing and pastures with Bart Davidson and Garry McDouall. There will be some interesting field visits throughout the adventure, including a tour of Rangers Valley Feedlot and local farms that will showcase their achievements in agriculture and natural resource management

NRCMA ACTION ON THE GROUND BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES OF CARBON MAN- AGEMENT ON NORTHERN RIVERS FARMS - GLENRAC

This 4 year project is in its 2nd year and will continue regardless of the LLS changes. Glenrac has three properties involved in this study.

The project will monitor the effects of different farming practices including the use of "alternate" fertilizers and biological and conservation farming practices on soil health.

LANDCARE AUSTRALIA FUNDING - MEASURE TO MANAGE WORK- SHOPS, BART DAVIDSON

This funding includes a contribution to the Landcare Adventure in March as well as soil and feed testing and a 4th workshop covering grazing charts and test results next autumn.

Tropical Soda Apple is still a real Weed Threat

People buying cattle from the Grafton area are being reminded of the potential for Tropical Soda Apple to germinate and spread in the Glen Innes region.

Infested Areas

The plant has been found in land adjacent to the Inverell Sale Yards, the closest infestations found to Glen Innes so far.

A trial at Tenterfield where Tropical Soda Apple plants were kept in pots and exposed to frosts revealed that the plants survived through the cold, icy weather conditions

Tropical Soda Apple was first identified in Australia at Kempsey in the Macleay catchment intruding into the Armidale Dumaresq Council area. area on the Mid North Coast of New South Wales (NSW) in August 2010. However, this weed is believed to have been present in the area for years.

Means of Spread

Anecdotal evidence indicates that fruit of Tropical Soda Apple is eaten by cattle, feral animals and birds resulting in distribution of seed over wide areas.

It is **strongly recommended** that stock from affected areas are held in a quarantine area for 48 hours before being transported to other properties or to sale. Prevent stock from grazing and moving through infested areas and check cattle handling facilities, cattle camps and yards for new infestations.

Identification

Tropical Soda Apple is a perennial shrub native to Brazil and Argentina. Plants grow to 1.8m in height and width, leaves are broad 15-20 cm long and 5.1-15.2 cm wide, hairy and resemble Fig leaves.

The entire plant has 2 cm long straight prickles. Flowering year round, flowers are white 5 petaled and develop in clusters below the leaves, fruit are 2.5cm in diameter (golf ball size) and resemble a watermelon but turn yellow at maturity.

Control

Council's Weeds Officer will assist with identification, control information including removal and eradication. Individual plants can be manually removed, but care must be taken to remove all the root material, as plants will regrow from root fragments. Fruit should be collected and disposed of appropriately (deep burial or burnt).

Legislation

Tropical soda apple is declared a Class 2 or 3 noxious weed throughout NSW. Under the NSW *Noxious Weeds Act 1993*, the presence of a Class 2 weed must be notified to the Local Control Authority and the plant must be eradicated from the land and the land must be

kept free of the plant. In areas where it is a class 3 weed, the plant including all fruiting material must be fully and continuously suppressed according to a management plan agreed by the Minister for Primary Industries.



A NEW FORM OF FOX CONTROL?

Could this be a new species of flying fox ?

An amazing picture of an eagle dealing with Reynard, taken by grazier Scott Bell in Western Australia. Department of Parks and Wildlife officer Matt Swan says although wedge-tailed eagles often scavenge for food they are also canny hunters. "They will go to carrion that is on the ground, kangaroo carcasses and things like that," he says. "But they are very adept hunters as well. They take a wide variety of food like small bobtails to prey items that are many times their own weight - wallabies or young kangaroos."

Lake Varley farmer Scott Bell managed to photograph a wedge-tailed eagle with a live fox in its claws. "We just finished picking up wheat from the harvester and saw a fox jump out of the crop then an eagle came out of nowhere and grabbed it." he said. "I jumped out of the tractor and managed to take that photo. Right place, right time. Just lucky I guess."

DIRT TO DOLLARS WORKSHOP @ THE LYNN'S

The 6th November saw a group of enthusiastic landholders journey out to the Lynn's organic goat/ cropping property south of Glen Innes. The Lynn's volunteered to host the field day after attending the Healthy Soils workshop held earlier in the year. Both days were facilitated by Resource Consulting services teacher and consultant, Garry McDouall.

The Dirt to Dollars workshop was an on-farm day spent looking at soil, grass, animals, and infrastructure. The aim throughout this day was to create discussion around how to implement the principles learned at "Healthy Soils" and make the system work in the best possible way. Garry covered topics as broad as weeds, organics, compost, cropping, grazing management and dry time management.

Both of these workshops are supported by GLENRAC and the Border Rivers-Gwydir Catchment Management Authority, through funding from the NSW Government and the Australian Government's Caring for our Country.





The Farm Innovation Fund is an incentive-based initiative to assist farmers within NSW to identify and address risks to their farming enterprises, improve permanent farm infrastructure, ensure long term productivity and sustainable land use. BOOK REVIEW



Australian Agriculture Its History and Challenges

Agriculture in Australia has had a lively history. The first European settlers in 1788 brought agricultural technologies with them from their homelands, influencing early practices in Australia. Wool production dominated the 19th century, while dairying grew rapidly during the first half of the 20th century. Written in a readable style to suit students of history, social sciences and agriculture, *Australian Agriculture* will also appeal to professionals in the industry and those with a general interest in Australian sociology and history.

Flocks of Colour

With introductory essays by ornithologist Penny Olsen, *Flocks of Colour* covers two and a quarter centuries of discovery and illustration of Australia's avifauna. It features a rich portfolio of images of all the Australian parrots, by various artists including John Gould, Edward Lear, Neville W Cayley and William T Cooper, selected from the collections of the National Library of Australia.

The foreword is by Joseph Forshaw, a world expert on the parrot family.





Robert David Fitzgerald (1830

-1892) was a successful colonial surveyor who had arrived in Australia in 1856 as a young Irish immigrant of 25. He was employed by the Lands Department in New South Wales and, although he was an exemplary public servant, he was also one of the last of the Victorian-era gentlemen scientists: an avid naturalist, ornithologist and skilled taxidermist. In 1864, while searching for birds to add to his collection, he was inspired by the discovery of a clump of Rock Lilies (*Dendrobium speciosum*) to collect a number of other orchid specimens in the area.


