### **INTRODUCING GLENRAC'S NEW DROUGHT SUPPORT OFFICER**

The Glen Innes Natural Resources Advisory Committee (GLENRAC) have successfully attained \$100,000 of drought support funding through an extension of the Australian Government Drought Communities Programme (DCP). The funding, which has been distributed to GLENRAC via the Glen Innes Severn Council, has been used to employ Kyle Holliss as a full-time Drought Support Officer for the remainder of the year.

Kyle, who is the eldest son of Pinkett landholders, Tony and Barb Holliss, has recently returned to Glen Innes with his young family. During his time away, Kyle worked as a communications specialist for the Australian Defence Force. including deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan as part of the Special Operations Task Group, and as a manager of the implementation of driverless truck fleets, industrial scale wireless networks and R&D Ag technology systems.

"It's great to be back in Glen Innes after so many years away," said Kyle. "Even though we've seen a great change in season in many parts of the area, the financial and emotional pressures of drought are far from over. I'm really looking forward to supporting landholders and the wider community as they navigate the tricky months ahead."

As part of his role as Drought Support Officer, Kyle will work closely with land holders, businesses, community groups and members to provide assistance with drought forms and applications, financial support and accessing further resources, such as referrals to wellbeing services. *Continued page 3.*




# Dogs4Jobs Do you have a work dog that needs rehoming? Dogs4Jobs is a holistic working dog





**Continued from page 1.** Kyle will also co-ordinate a number of free Smoko events across the smaller towns and villages in the region to ensure face-to-face support is reaching all in need. In the past, these events have run in areas including Glen Elgin, Aqua Park, Emmaville, Wellingrove, Torrington, Pinkett and Dundee, and featured presenters from the Rural Financial Counselling Service, the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services, New England Weeds Authority, Rural Crime, Hunter New England Health, Stringybark Ecological, as well as pest animal consultants.

Kyle's position will build upon GLENRAC's important role as a drought support service in the Glen Innes community. Since 2019, the natural resources organisation has supported more than 2,500 people through drought support events, workshops, allocation of donations and face-to-face meetings. # DROUGHT AND BUSHFIRE FUNDING YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT



**SPECIAL DISASTER RECOVERY GRANT** – Up to \$75,000 for primary producers whose properties were directly impacted by last summer's bushfires.

RIC DROUGHT LOAN — Loans up to \$2 million for primary producers to prepare for, manage or recover from the effects of drought. 1.92% interest, first 2 years interest free (applications received before 30th Sept 2020), 10 year term.

DROUGHT ASSISTANCE FUND – Interest-free loans up to \$100,000 for primary producers to implement systems and management practices that enhance the sustainability of their farm business. 7 year term, no repayments for first 2 years. Can be used for restocking purposes.

EMERGENCY DROUGHT TRANSPORT SUBSIDY —
Round 3 of the Drought Transport Subsidy open
from 1 July 2020. Eligible primary producers can
claim up to a maximum of \$25,000 up to 31 Dec
2020, subject to funds being available. From the 1
July 2020, the subsidy has been expanded to include
transport of purchased stock to a farm business.
Invoices for Round 2 2019/20 movements will
only be processed until 30th September 2020.

# COVID-19 SUPPORT FOR PRIMARY PRODUCERS

The NSW Department of Primary Industries has established a COVID-19 Primary Industries Liaison Team to help primary producers navigate the challenges and impacts of COVID-19 on their business and industry. ### **PROJECT NEWS AND ACTIVITIES**

### **ROADSIDE WEEDS BEWARE!**

GLENRAC is taking aim at invasive roadside weeds in their latest project. Working in collaboration with Glen Innes Severn Council and New England Weeds Authority, the project, which is funded by the Australian Government's Communities Combatting Pest and Weed Impacts During Drought Program, will target priority weeds on roadsides that are not widespread in surrounding paddocks in order to limit their spread. Whilst the aim is to address any roadside weeds of concern, the focus will be on invasive grass weeds such as Whisky Grass, Coolatai Grass and Giant Paramatta Grass.

"NEWA is looking forward to working collaboratively with GLENRAC and Glen Innes Landholders to identify and treat locally significant weed infestations," said New England Weeds Authority Biosecurity Officer, Trent McIntyre. "One focus of the project will be the roadside weedy grass species. Another is new and emerging species that are identified as being of concern, especially those introduced through feed and fodder. The long-term goal of the project is to reduce these infestations to a point where they are easily managed into the future by NEWA and Landholders."

The project will also assist farmers to identify new weeds that have been introduced to the area through drought and bushfire fodder and help landholders to control these weeds before they spread.

Landholders are encouraged to contact Trent McIntyre from New England Weeds Authority on 0438 501 286 if they notice any unusual weed species growing or bring a bagged sample into the GLENRAC office at 68 Church St Glen Innes for identification. New England Weeds Authority will attend all GLENRAC's upcoming Smoko events and attendees are invited to bring bagged weed samples along for identification.

Opportunities for people to work with New England Weeds Authority or as weed spraying contractors will also be made available through the roadside weeds project, injecting money back into the local community. # SUCCESSFUL RELEASE OF REGENT HONEYEATERS!

This June, 20 captive bred Regent Honeyeaters were released into bushland on private property in the Lower Hunter to supplement the local population. The release is just a small part of a multi-organisation recovery program for the critically endangered species that includes habitat protection, fire management, captive breeding, population monitoring, and advance habitat improvement methods including the propagation and planting of Mistletoe high in the forest canopy to provide food and nesting sites.

### **PROJECT NEWS AND ACTIVITIES**

### **SOIL EROSION PROJECT**

GLENRAC will assist a number of landholders in the district to address active areas of soil erosion through a project funded by the NSW Environmental Trust. The project will address issues of stream bank and gully erosion and biodiversity loss through on ground worksincluding gully and streambank stabilisation, fencing and revegetation with grasses, native trees and shrubs. Most of the project sites were first looked at a couple of years ago and earthworks designed and costed to address the issue. Sourcing funding to assist landholders to undertake the works has taken time and in that time changes have occurred with some erosion sites getting significantly worse, so sites have been revisited recently to adjust planned earthworks. Works will be undertaken in coming months, avoiding the summer storm season.





# LITTLE LLANGOTHLIN NATURE RESERVE RAMSAR PROJECT YEAR 3

Recent rains have brought hundreds of water birds back to Little Llangothlin Nature Reserve and its lagoon which is now 40% full! GLENRAC Project Manager, Dr Mahri Koch recently attended the quarterly bird survey at the Lagoon with NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service for the National Landcare Program RAMSAR project, and was impressed by the diversity of bird species on offer. "Clouds of hundreds of Grey Teal and other duck species and water birds kept our volunteer bird spotters busy at our recent quarterly bird survey," said Dr Koch. "Black swans competed for the best nesting sites while the woodland birds – pardalotes, honeyeaters, parrots, and wrens – practised social distancing in the New England Peppermint woodland. "Thanks to National Parks and Wildlife Service Ranger, Koen Dikistra for the opportunity to contribute to the survey."

### **WEED WATCH: AFRICAN LOVEGRASS**

African lovegrass (*Eragrostis curvula*) is a widely distributed invasive grass species in the Northern Tablelands. It has low feed value, can quickly colonize disturbed areas and can grow to a large perennial tussock grass of 1.2m in height. African lovegrass grows on acidic, sandy soils with low fertility and can tolerate heat, drought and frosts. It is a born survivor.

Locally, there are 2 species of African lovegrass; Curvula (*Eragrostis curvula curvula*) has lime to dark green leaves and Blue chloromelas (*Eragrostis curvula chloromelas*) has blue-green



leaves. Leaves are narrow (3 mm wide) and often curl near the tips, and the leaf margins are often folded or rolled inwards. Reproduction is only by seeds which are dispersed by water, animals, in hay and fodder, earthwork machinery and vehicles. Roadside slashing equipment is commonly blamed for spreading seeds. Every effort should be made to prevent African Lovegrass from becoming established on your property.

To reduce chances for African lovegrass to enter your property avoid bringing in hay, grain, or silage from African lovegrass areas, limit animal movement from infested areas into clean paddocks, check the coats of new stock for weed seeds, quarantine new stock for at least 10 days, clean vehicles and machinery before coming onto your property, inspect hay or fodder for weed seeds, broadcast seed for desirable species in disturbed pastures, revegetate unproductive areas, spray the boundaries of infested paddocks with a 20–25 m strip.
