PEST ANIMAL MANAGEMENT AND LANDHOLDER ENGAGEMENT IN NEW ENGLAND NSW

This is a new project that is up and running in the region. The project has numerous partners and runs until June 2013. The project aims to reduce the threats to endangered ecological communities and threatened species in the New England region of NSW. In addition, it aims to raise awareness about the impact of pest animals such as pigs, foxes, wild dogs and rabbits on our valuable natural assets as well as agricultural production. Landholders will be engaged in cooperative program to control and manage these pests, as cooperative and integrated approaches have been recognised as the most effective methods for controlling pest animals. The project will be delivering a number of field days and training workshops over the life of the project. PESTSMART has a range of fact

INVASIVE ANIMALS PHD SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

To better understand the Australian community's role in controlling invasive animals, four Invasive Animals CRC "Facilitating Community Action" PhD scholarships are on offer for study commencing in 2013 at the University of New England, Armidale, NSW. The doctoral researchers will work within a research program being led by University of New England, Penn State University (USA) and Griffith University academics. The research is concerned with supporting and enabling communities and community

groups to manage pest and feral animals. The research program is also intended to consider ways to improve the effectiveness of community-engaged research involving a variety of disciplines.

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PUBLIC CONSULTATION OPENS FOR NEXT PHASE OF CARING FOR OUR COUNTRY

The Gillard Government has invited the community to help shape the next phase of Caring for our Country by participating in a new round of public consultation.

Environment Minister Tony Burke and Agriculture Minister Senator Joe Ludwig released An Outline for the Future which sets out the broad framework for the next five years.

"An Outline for the Future document sets out the strategic objectives of Caring for our Country to ensure Australia's environmental assets are conserved, resilient and healthy, and our agricultural base is sustainable, productive and resilient.

"I encourage all stakeholders to have their say to ensure the design of the new program reflects the knowledge and experience of the community." Consultation will run until 15 August. SOIL CARBON SPECIALIST SAYS A BREAKTHROUGH IS NEAR

A holy grail for Australian farmers is soil carbon, or at least finding ways to measure it. If farmers can get a baseline measurement on how much carbon is in their soil, and then work to improve that amount, they could earn significant amounts of money from carbon credits.

Terry McCosker is an agricultural consultant who is pretty confident that he has cracked the code of soil carbon. In conjunction with the CSIRO he has come up with equipment and techniques that allow him to measure soil carbon more accurately than ever before.

Terry is a highly respect figure in Australian agriculture for his work in holistic soil management. He has been dubbed the father of cell-grazing in Australia.
