## UNCOVERING CYCAD SECRETS AT WARIALDA

The cycad is an ancient and mysterious species that dates back to the days of the dinosaurs, and it seems that Warialda in Northern NSW could be Cycad Central!

Amateur botanist John Hodge believes he has discovered up to eleven new types of cycad in the Warialda region. There are currently less than 300 different types of cycad documented worldwide.

# STRATEGIC REGIONAL LAND USE PLANNING

Office of Environment & Heritage (OEH) is providing soil and land information to the Department of Planning and Infrastructure for the development of biophysical strategic agricultural land (BSAL) maps as part of the NSW Government's strategic regional land use policy. In supporting the release of the

draft Upper Hunter and New England-North West strategic regional land use plans, maps of land and soil capability and derived inherent soil fertility for those areas have been released. Further maps will be made available as more strategic regional land use plans are released. # 19-YEAR-OLD COMBINES FARMING AND TECH EXPERIENCE

Alex Schimp started learning programming at age 11. Now, at age 19, he has developed an iPhone and iPod Touch application that will help certified organic farmers keep their crop records organized with simple clicks and taps of their fingers. Schimp launched his Seed to Harvest iPhone and iPod Touch app in March. The app—available as a limited free version and a full version through Apple's "App Store" gives certified organic farmers the ability to record vital information right on the field (since the information logging aspect of the app does not require Internet access). Farmers can use the app to keep track of information such as when they plant certain crops, how much of the crop they plant and where it's planted; the input of soil amendments.
