



The farming business stream of the project, *Improving Farm Business Skills* (which is held online every Thursday from 1:00pm-2:00pm) has already proved to be hugely successful, with more than 90 attendees tuning in to listen to Roma-based book keeper, Rachel Nixon, discuss strategies for successful record keeping.

A similar stream of weekly webinars focussed on improving local community business skills is set to release later this month, with a range of industry-run webinars that have been tailor-made to suit the needs of businesses in the Glen Innes community.

"Due to the current COVID-19 restrictions, these workshops have launched as a series of online webinars – a new avenue for GLENRAC, but a platform which we expect to utilise more regularly heading into the future and beyond isolation," said GLENRAC Chief Executive Officer, Kylie Falconer.

"The great thing about these events taking place online is that we can engage industry professionals who we may not otherwise have been able to access, and attendees have the flexibility to log onto the webinars from the comfort of their own homes. Even better, if they are unable to tune in at the time of the event, so long as they have registered with GLENRAC beforehand, a recording of the workshop will be emailed to them to watch at a time that suits," said Falconer.

PROJECT NEWS AND EVENTS

Little Llangothlin Nature Reserve RAMSAR Project Year 2

We made it through the second year of the National Landcare Program Phase 2 RAMSAR project at Little Llangothlin Nature Reserve – a year of drought, wildfires, flooding rains, COVID-19 office closure and social distancing. The recent rains have provided some water to the Lagoon, and many bird species have returned to feed there. Future good rains will see groundwater revived and breeding of threatened bird species, such as the Australasian Bittern, hopefully resumed.

Working with Local Land Services, we had an information filled day at Ben Lomond before COVID-19 became evident. Pest animal officers, Perry Newman and Chris Watters, showed landholders the most effective way to set up fox and wild dog traps and baits, and pre-feeding techniques for feral pig management.



Regent Honeyeater: Have You Seen One? Through the National Landcare Program Phase 2, GLENRAC has partnered with Local Land Services for a five-year federally funded project centred on the critically endangered Regent Honeyeater bird. Year 2 of the project has engaged many of our local landcare groups and community groups interested in birds to raise awareness of: what kind of habitat the RH needs to survive, how to recognise its calls, and encouraging improvement of on-farm Regent Honeyeater habitat.

Earlier this year, we met up with community members at Deepwater Brewery for an information session on the Regent Honeyeater, with local landholder Tom Faithfull (*pictured*) guiding us through lots of interesting facts and photos about the bird and where it can be locally found.

WEEDS TO WATCH OUT FOR: PARTHENIUM WEED!



Parthenium weed (*Parthenium hysterophorus*) is native to the Caribbean, southern United States of America and central America. It was introduced to central Queensland in the 1950's in contaminated pasture seed from Texas USA.

The weed is identified as a significant biosecurity risk in NSW, and is listed as Prohibited Matter in Schedule 2 of the NSW Biosecurity Act 2015. Previously, there was no established population of Parthenium weed in NSW, with all infestations being eradicated. However, Parthenium weed has been discovered recently on a drought feeding station on the slopes and plains west of the Northern Tablelands. The weed is believed to have been carried by millet hay from northern Queensland which was imported for feed during the 2019 drought.

Parthenium weed invades pastures and crops. It causes severe human health risks, such as respiratory problems and severe dermatitis. It can also cause health problems in livestock. The weed is toxic to livestock, out-competes pastures, can taint the flavour of meat, reduces crop yields, contaminates grain and is a host plant for crop viruses. Parthenium weed should never be touched with bare hands.

Seeds are introduced into NSW mainly on or in harvesting machinery, hay and grain, heavy vehicles that have picked up mud in QLD, and vehicles and machinery from infested areas of QLD. Seeds can also be moved in contaminated soil, potting mix or compost.

With the severe drought of 2019, followed by summer and autumn rains, it is important to check your property for any plant that is unfamiliar, especially in sacrifice paddocks, feed-out areas and hay storage locations.
