GLENRAC celebrates 25 years of Landcare

2014 marks 25 years since the formation of the Glen Innes Natural Resource Advisory Committee as the umbrella group for the many local Landcare groups across the Glen Innes district

GLENRAC was formed in 1989 by a group of concerned land managers to address land degradation issues occurring across the Glen Innes district including salinity and soil erosion problems caused by tree clearing, die-back and overproduction. The committee goals were to investigate issues of land and catchment degradation.

Members of the inaugural committee were Chairman, David Donnelly (Major Glen Innes); Secretary Phil Fogarty, committee members Len Donnelly (Severn Shire President); Helen Kennedy (Severn Shire Councillor), George Rozynski (Glen Innes Municipal Council), John Turner (PP Board), Brian Furrez and Steve Thoms (Forestry), Robert Weir (Dundee landholder) and Des Fitzgerald and Guy Robinson (Dept. of Ag.. & Fisheries).

Many things have changed since this first committee but the objectives of GLENRAC remain constant "to improve the productive environmental and social resource base of the Glen Innes district."

GLENRAC will celebrate achieving this milestone with a **25th Anniversary Dinner** to be held on Thursday 25th September at the Glen Innes District Services Club from 7:00pm. This will follow the GLENRAC AGM at to be held at 6:00pm.


GLENRAC News

Spring Time Noxious Weeds

Paterson's Curse, Vipers Bugloss, Gorse, English/Scotch Broom, Sweet Briar and Nodding Thistle are the noxious weeds in the Glen Innes Severn Council area that either flower and or produce seed in the spring season.

Paterson's Curse and Vipers Bugloss are the first plants to set seed. Both plants are *Echium* species and look very similar but differ in rosette leaves and vary in flower colour. It is strategically important to control Paterson's Curse and Vipers Bugloss prior to flowering so as to stop seed set because the plants set seeds early in the flowering process. Seeds can number over 30,000 per square metre in dense patches.

Paterson's Curse is often regarded as being non-toxic or of low toxicity but evidence has been presented that alkaloids in the plant may cause liver damage in stock leading to loss of condition and sometimes death. Pigs are most susceptible to poisoning, followed by horses, whilst sheep, cattle and goats are least affected. There have been no stock deaths reported in the Glen Innes Severn Local Government area associated with Patterson's Curse. Paterson's Curse was introduced to Australia as a garden ornamental.

Gorse and English/Scotch Broom once established can take a considerable amount of time to reduce infestations because of the prolific amount of seeds the shrubs produce. There are up to 40,000 gorse seeds/m² under a mature gorse bush at any one time. Up to 90% of gorse seed in the soil at any time is "hard" which can lie dormant for decades before it germinates. Gorse plants can live up to 30 years with English/Scotch Broom plants living up to 15 years.

English/Scotch Broom and Gorse were introduced to Australia as garden ornamentals with Gorse being used as a hedging plant.

Sweet Briar is an erect shrub to 3 m, commonly 1.5 to 2 m. It has pink or white flowers with small prickles along the leaf stalk. The fruit are orange to red in a capsule shape with short spines at the stalk end.

Sweet Briar flowers in late spring to summer with the best results for chemical control throughout spring and early summer periods. Sweet Briar was also introduced to Australia as a garden ornamental plant.

Nodding Thistle germinates mostly in late summer, autumn and early winter but some germination also occurs in spring, especially if there is enough moisture available. Plants only flower once then die but slashed plants will survive until they flower.

Nodding Thistle seeds may survive in the soil for a long time. New Zealand studies indicate that up to 13 years may be required to completely deplete a soil bank.

Seedling density may reach 100 to 200 per square metre but with a very high natural mortality with usually less than 20% of seedlings surviving to maturity.

The presence of biological insects on properties has aided in the reduction of the Nodding Thistle seed bank. The CSIRO is confident that, given more time, the remaining seed bank should be substantially reduced.


Nodding Thistle was introduced to Australia as a contaminant in pasture seed from New Zealand.

Nodding Thistle germinates mostly in late summer, autumn and early winter but some germination also occurs in spring, especially if there is enough moisture available. Plants only flower once then die but slashed plants will survive until they flower.



News from GLENRAC's Partner Organisations

Landholders Looking After Little Llangothlin Lagoon

WetlandCare Australia and the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services are working in partnership, funded by the Australian Government's Caring for our Country program, to protect and enhance the ecological character of the Little Llangothlin Lagoon Ramsar site.

The site is listed as being of International Importance under the Ramsar convention, to which Australia is a signatory. The convention aims to conserve wetlands which are rare or unique, or important for conserving biological diversity.

Little Llangothlin Lagoon and surrounding landscape is recognised as providing internationally important waterbird habitat and supporting various nationally threatened plant and animal species and several threatened ecological communities.

This project has engaged farmers in the Lagoon's catchment to increase productivity and farm health, while improving wetland condition and protecting habitat values through the provision of livestock fencing and alternate watering infrastructure. The project is also partnering with NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service to undertake on-site tree planting works within the Little Llangothlin Nature Reserve to restore native vegetation communities bordering the lagoon.

Native vegetation health will be improved over 200 ha across the project area, including areas of Upland Wetlands and New England Peppermint Woodland, both threatened ecological communities. Water quality and native fauna habitat in and around the internationally significant Little Llangothlin Lagoon wetland will also be enhanced. Works undertaken will also contribute to reducing weed invasion and expanding key habitat and corridors within the region.

WetlandCare Australia has a long history of working with partner organisations and landholders within the New England Tablelands to provide mutually beneficial outcomes for farmers, wetlands and threatened species and communities. Assistance available for landholders for biodiversity projects

The Northern Tablelands Local Land Services has funding available under the "Brigalow Nandewar Biolinks" program to support projects that manage, protect and restore native vegetation and improve landscape scale connectivity. Activities eligible for funding include fencing, planting native trees, direct seeding with native seeds, and weed management. For projects that protect and manage stream banks and native vegetation along streamside areas funding is available to subsidise the cost of alternate stock water infrastructure (pumps, pipes, tanks and troughs). Joint projects across property boundaries are encouraged to increase the effectiveness of projects. Funding is competitive and there is a limit to what funding is available. Priority will be given to proposals that protect and/or plant native vegetation beside or connected to streams, creeks and rivers.

Expressions of interest are invited by calling Martin Dillon or lestyn Taylor at the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services Armidale office on 02 6772 2366. LLS staff will work with you to design, develop and cost a project proposal ready for competitive assessment. The due date for the next round of project proposals is 15th September 2014. Proposals will be reviewed by an assessment panel in early October and successful projects will then have a management agreement developed and signed.

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Funding Opportunities

What help is now available for drought affected farmers?

Income assistance for farmers

The Farm Household Allowance (FHA) is available now for farmers and their partners who are experiencing financial difficulty.

The FHA is a fortnightly income support payment available Australia-wide, without the need for a drought declaration. The FHA has been designed to suit the circumstances of farmers and their partners. Farmers are urged not to self-assess their eligibility but to contact the Department of Human Services to explore their options. Further information is available by calling the Farmer Assistance Hotline on 132 316 (8am - 8pm).

Drought Concessional Loan Scheme

Drought concessional loans are now available to help farm businesses recover from drought, prepare for future droughts and return to viability in the long term. Loans are available for any combination of debt restructuring; operating expenses and/or/drought recovery and preparedness activities. Loan amounts are up to 50 per cent of a farm business's total eligible debt to a maximum of \$1 million. The loans will have a term of five years, with a concessional interest rate period of five
