GLENRAC receives \$100,000 funding for drought support

The Glen Innes Natural Resources Advisory Committee are pleased to announce they have received \$100,000 of drought support funding through the Australian Government Drought Communities Programme (DCP). The funding, which will be distributed to GLENRAC via the Glen Innes Severn Council, will be extremely beneficial in increasing the output and resources available at GLENRAC during this period of significant drought, and will allow for the employment of a full time Drought Support Officer to be based at the Glen Innes office.

"Council is pleased to be able to support GLENRAC through the Federal Government's Drought Communities Programme," says Graham Price, the Director of Development, Regulatory and Sustainability Resources at GISC. "GLENRAC is a highly regarded organisation within the local community, particularly the farming community, with over 700 members. A Drought Support Officer will provide support for landholders in accessing funding and understanding the sometimes complex grant application process. The funding will also allow GLENRAC to facilitate additional high quality events that provide landholders with relevant information to assist in the decision making process during this difficult time."

The role of Drought Support Officer will be shared between existing GLENRAC Landcare Coordinators, Kylie Falconer and Lucy Faithfull, and will provide on the ground drought-support to farmers and families in the local community. One of their primary aims will be to raise awareness of the number of avenues of support available to families, including financial assistance through Drought Aid, the CWA of NSW, St Vincent's de Paul and the Salvation Army, and drought subsidies and loans available to farmers, including the freight and water infrastructure rebates obtainable through the NSW Rural Assistance Authority. The Drought Support Officer will assist community members with lodging these applications, a process that can be timely, requires access to council notices and tax invoices, and the scanning and uploading of documents online. A number of regular weekly drop-in days at villages around the area, including Deepwater, Emmaville, Glencoe and Torrington, will ensure those in more remote areas are receiving an equal measure of support in obtaining access to drought funding.

Chairperson of GLENRAC, John Bavea, says the critical funding obtained from the DCP will be used by GLENRAC to ensure that drought support and help is getting into the hands of those that need it, regardless of whether they live in the townships or in the countryside. "With this funding, GLENRAC is particularly charged with concentrating on the social and community impacts outside the Glen Innes town area in a manner that's going to provide economic stimulus to those within the town," says John.

With the assistance of the Drought Support Officer, GLENRAC will organise a number of events across the community in 2019 that address areas of concern during times of drought, while also generating income for small businesses and community groups through catering, venue hire and the purchasing of materials. Some of these events will include a Farmer Update on the 17th of April and a Men's Night Out on the 17th of May.


Take a quick break from the farm and spend time with mates at a village near you on a Wednesday till end of June 2019. Smoko will run from 10am until 11am and it's FREE.






Trees on Small Farms wrap up -Kelly Walsh

Trees on Small Farms Partnership Project is now nearly complete with 11,000 Seedlings being planted on small farms in the Glen Innes area. With the continued drought this project has had its fair share of ups and downs including a number of landholders pulling out at the last minute. This meaning these seedlings needed to find homes fast and due to our tough summer this was found to be a very difficult task. Thankfully Rangers Valley have agreed to take these excess seedlings and give them the best care. All final site inspections will take place over the coming weeks with this project ending 1st May 2019.

Ramsar - Mahri Koch



The Project will, over the five years of its life, provide a clear understanding of the ecological condition and function of the Little Llangothlin Nature Reserve to inform future

management. GLENRAC is working with NPWS staff, LLS staff, and UNE scientists to deliver this project which is highlighting threatened species and communities, and protection and enhancement of the Reserve for future generations.

Monitoring surveys of flora, fauna, water quality and wetland health are also be used to engage surrounding landholders in



supporting actions to further restore the Ramsar site. Year 1 revegetation of the lagoon's woodland community is almost done! "

Weed risks during drought WHAT IS A WEED?

Bottom line summary: Annual Costs of Weeds in Australia

Weeds are estimated to impose an overall average cost of nearly \$5 billion across Australia. Chemical control across broad acre cropping enterprises and production loss costs among grain, beef and wool industries make up most of these impacts. Overall costs have increased by more than 20% over the 14 years since the Sinden et al (2004) study.

The prevalence of weeds in the livestock industry was assumed to be the same, largely because no evidence has been accumulated in the last 14 years to gauge the degree of impacts weed cause of livestock carrying capacity and production losses. This information gap is important as weed competition in these animal industries contributes a quarter to overall national weed costs.

Weed control and production losses due to residual weeds in Australia are included in Table 1 for low, average and high weed impact scenarios. An average production loss cost of \$4,823 million is estimated for winter and summer broad acre cropping, rice, cotton, horticulture and livestock industries, using the 'economic surplus' approach. As in previous studies, the difference between the loss-expenditure and economic surplus approaches to costing is small. Costs to agricultural industries comprise the majority of total costs, as public expenditures are less than \$200m of the overall mean cost of \$4,989 million in 2018. Table 1 includes details for low, average and high cost scenarios.

Drought and Weeds

When feed and fodder are brought onto your property from outside NSW, you risk introducing new weeds. During these dry times there has been a lot of movement of feed from interstate. From a weed perspective, this means you may be importing weeds from anywhere on the Australian mainland. Although feed movement is a necessary activity, there are a number of strategies we can put in place to help ensure this difficult period is not compounded by years of costly and labour intensive weed control into the future.

Sacrifice Paddocks. Where possible feed out imported stock feeds in the same location. If we are introducing weeds in stock feed, particularly hay, it is best we limit the area over which these weeds are spread. If there are few feeding locations it is easier to be on the lookout for the growth of unfamiliar species when conditions improve.

Vehicle Hygiene. The trucks that are transporting this stock feed have also been on properties in the source location. Vehicles and agricultural equipment have always been a major vector for transporting weeds. Be mindful of how clean these vehicles are when they enter your property and again be observant for new species in places these vehicles have been.

Bare Soils. The reduction in vegetative cover during prolonged dry spells provides great opportunity for new species to become established. As we often discuss the best way to control the introduction of weeds to a property is by having a healthy pasture with good ground coverage. Unfortunately that is not always possible.

Weeds are a costly Biosecurity threat, so keep an eye out for any plants you don't recognize and act quickly. You can call us if you spot an unknown plant on your property and we will assist in identification and control
